

Weather



This year I managed to grow four giant sunflowers (Helianthus Annuus) - without sowing any seeds. This was done by the birds. One seed even managed to germinate in the hard ground outside my driveway gate. When it was about a foot high, the flower bud was pinched by a passing animal, but I ended up with twelve smaller flowers. Another sunflower grew to five feet high with the flower eleven inches across and the seed core eight inches.

A recent incident involving the birds in my back garden was interesting. I frequently get about fifty of different kinds plus one rook who speaks away to himself in a very deep and croaky voice. A few times a day a kestrel joins in. The noise the other birds make as they escape is quite loud and sudden, so much so, it can cause the cows in the neighbouring field to stampede!

On the 12th September a large group of at least fifty swallows were still on the wires around Laggan Dairy farm but were away the next day. Astronomically the planet Jupiter is almost overhead before dawn and very bright. Around the 15th October and looking low to the ESE, again before dawn, you may be able to see the red planet Mars. With binoculars and slightly to the left you may be able to spot Ison, while 20° further to the left there is comet Encke. It is still very uncertain how bright Ison will become. Only now is the comet approaching the Solar System's equivalent of the snow line which lies outside the orbit of Mars. When this occurs, water-ice in the comet's nucleus will sublimate that is, turn directly from a solid to a gas. How Ison behaves at this point will indicate just how active it is likely to get i.e. how long and how bright a tail it will acquire.

Letter from the Minister



Dear friends,

With this mild weather I guess some of you won't have put your heating on or started using a hot water bottle. However I am sure we will soon be putting on the various layers on our bed in order to ensure we are kept warm as we sleep.

While we do have to cope with the cold at least we can sleep without the fear of being bitten by insects, unless you leave a window open for midges to enter the room.

Sleeping in Malawi is not so safe as there is a high probability that as you sleep a mosquito will bite. The resultant itch is bad enough but in Malawi there is also a chance that the mosquito was carrying the Malaria virus. The initial symptoms of malaria are flu-like and include a fever, headache, sweats, chills and vomiting, however if it is not treated properly it can lead to life-threatening complications. Malaria is the number one cause of death in Malawi, with children under 5 and pregnant women most at risk.


However with just a simple net covering covering the bed, those sleeping on the bed can do so protected from the mosquitoes. A simple net that can save lives.

In order to help provide these much needed nets for more of the population (as only 55% of the population of Malawi currently have them) the Presbytery of Ayr have just launched an alternative gift scheme, which allows you to give a gift of a mosquito net.

You pay £7, you get a gift card which you can give to family or friends, and a family in Malawi will receive a life saving net and be able to sleep safely for the first time. There are not many gifts that are life changing, but this is definitely one of them.
